Io all those who worked hard on making this happen! This fourth edition of the Grand Tour takes on a special aspect with the imminent move of the Visual Arts Department to the new Building A on the HEAD campus. Taking advantage of this moment of transition, the Grand Tour expands with the installation of the productions of 90 graduates in the spaces of this building with its distinctive horizon blue color, and in the historical buildings of the Boulevard Helvétique and James-Fazy for a last time.

In consultation with the students, we have chosen to give more structure to the presentation of this edition by inviting three curators, Olivia Fahmy, Trinity Njume Ebong and Camilla Paolino, to work in complicity with them. This collaboration with professionals, desired by those who are about to leave school, has reshuffled the deck. The exhibition that results from their collaboration deliberately mixes Bachelor and Master works in order to encourage aesthetic proximities and unexpected encounters.

Several collective projects designed to celebrate this moment of transition are also presented in this context, as well as proposals from the Cinema Department, which is moving with us into this new building.

Finally, in order to celebrate this stage in our history, the school have decided to present the exhibitions and the film, performance and meeting programs to a wider public during three 'blue' days. This will provide the opportunity to discover the new building or to say goodbye to those we are leaving.

A Grad Show is not only an exhibition. It is a threshold, a gate, a space of transition that isn't effortless to inhabit, for it requires laborious preparation, constant balancing, calibrated positioning. While lingering in this liminal space, one needs to recall where one comes from and consider where one is going. When the present artists exposing their work were enrolled, the world was a different place than it is at present. 2020 has been eventful in ways no one could foresee. The days were blue. Yet, blue isn't only the color of melancholy, the sound of sorrow. It is also the ground of resistance, the rhythms of empowerment, the longing for futurity. The year 2021 welcomed us with bridges to rebuild, solidarities to forge, communities to imagine.

How to act towards these ends? How to position oneself in this transmuted world as an art practitioner? What knowledge to embody and share, how to be held accountable in doing so, what tools and methods to refine to this purpose? These questions get more pressuring amidst these tumultuous times, while we learn to value mutual confidence and interdependency. Moreover, it is becoming evident that contingency and the material conditions of production cannot be escaped when making art.

In the framework of this exhibition, the color blue becomes a lubricant, facilitating our drift among a network of diverse practices, thinking processes, and stances. Faire demi-tour, moving forward, rebrousser chemin, sometimes getting lost, revenir sur ses pas, going ahead. Contemporary productions never cease to stretch time and space, weave connections, create fragmentations, dissonances, contradictions, and drifts. The diversion has never been so marked geographically as in this edition of HEAD's Grad Show, from the Boulevard Helvétique, followed by

Boulevard James Fazy, finally concluding within the industrial blue hues of Avenue de Châtelaine. It is the contours and détours that the artists have chosen to address that guide this exhibition. An exhibition built in conversation, with the ambition to include, where the color blue is a song of goodbye to the past, and potentially a melody embracing the future, even though this future is quite uncertain.

Curators' view

Geneva has recently undergone significant changes in its cultural landscape since our own days of enrolment at an art institution of higher education.

We have recently witnessed the departure of several landmark buildings; one could question how they were unclassified as spaces of local cultural heritage to begin with. We have also observed the urban development in the Jonction area—almost transforming overnight, unfortunately taking with it some of the biggest counter cultural sites of the city in terms of scale.

We have also seen the closure of over 100 semi-legal spaces of free expression, an event, no matter how insignificant one can observe it, really set the tone for a new strategy, a new direction for the artistic legacy of the city. It was once the era of impromptu theatres, occupied buildings, unlicensed cinemas and illegal nightclubs.

A need to offer services of social and creative impact that were available to all. Accessibility, transparency, experimentation and inclusivity seemed to be the main key words describing the state of mind during this period. Although 'inclusivity', at the time, was mostly limited to barriers of class.

Public institutions, in general, have the responsibility to reflect the changes being experienced outside of its boundaries. The biggest challenges that we face today are no longer just local, but also global. Extensive technological shifts in the last decade and a half have allowed us to not only 'see' more global but also to 'act' more global.

We must look at the challenges of the current world and find the appropriate solutions which best reflect our complex globalised world. Today, extra visibility has been placed on individuals with particular experiences, unique identities and specific challenges. New institutionalism is currently undergoing the interesting yet challenging task of accommodating all of our human sensitivities within one combined neutral sphere. A place of exchange, a place of discovery, not particularly a safe space, but more an environment that reflects one of the biggest challenges of the outside world: Co-existence despite variance.

We must learn to look at the memories of the past and to relive them within their full context, and avoid any temptation to 'go back' to the 'good old days'. There is never a way to go back as there is never a way to stop time.

We now celebrate the fruits of this past. The results. Its teachings. The remains of an era which have simply been passed on, understood, inspired and set-free to evolve.


Boulevard
