Why?</li> </ul> |
|  | <ul> <li>The first part will conclude with the ship-owner's point of view:</li> <li>How the business is structured?</li> <li>How profits are generated (assets and freight) and what are the cost structures?</li> <li>What are the risks and how can they mitigate them?</li> </ul>   |
|  | - <b>Part II:</b> <i>Shipping Brokerage</i><br>Shipbrokers are specialist intermediaries (i.e. brokers) between ship-<br>owners and charterers who use ships to transport cargo, or between<br>buyers and sellers of vessels. They help negotiating the terms of the<br>contract (freight and assets) and avoid problems between both parties.           |
|  | A shipbroker being in contact with most related activities, it is a good way<br>to learn everything about shipping and establish relationships. A post-  |



|                                      | <ul> <li>fixture analyst is likely to be an opportunity to start within a brokerage company.</li> <li>Part III: Shipping Operator This section will consider what a young operator needs to be effective. It is based on present and past experiences of various professionals. The position of ship operator is a good way of entering the shipping industry. The course will cover topics such as: <ul> <li>Laytime calculation which is really critical for any company.</li> <li>Maritime geography, key canals and their specification.</li> <li>Special zones: load zones, high risk areas, and special regulation in term of pollution.</li> </ul> Part IV: Legal Mr. Greffield will introduce the legal framework relevant to the shipping, the arbitration courts, and the types of claims encountered and how to manage legal risks is the shipping context. Part V: Shipping strategy and Trading house This section will be presented by a speaker from LafargeHolcim who will discuss why shipping is a strategic activity for a trading company and how it is integrated from a pragmatic point of view. Apart from the operational side, a good shipping strategy is critical to ensure margins, especially at a moment when the commodity price are at flat. <u>Reference:</u></li></ul> |
